Reflection

"Stay at home". The message appeared on my mobile on Tuesday morning following the Prime Minister's message to the nation on Monday evening. Whilst everyone will have received that message in some form, asking us to go out only for essential journeys to buy food/medicines or to go to work if that cannot be done from home, I'm aware that some reading this will have received a message to say that you must stay at home for 12 weeks. "Stay at home" — three words that will have an impact on all of us and we pray for one another as we each navigate this new and constantly changing situation.

The words "Stay at home" jump out for me towards the start of this long reading from John's Gospel. I have spent time thinking about whether it could be condensed, whether we could miss out verses, but its such a rich passage in

its entirety and to miss any is to miss much! You may be scouring your Bible now thinking "Ruth – the words "Stay at home" are not in this passage"...and you are correct. They are not. But take a look again at verse 6. Lazarus is ill and Mary and Martha have sent a message to Jesus saying to let him know. Our logical conclusion would be that Jesus would immediately drop everything and rush to Bethany where Lazarus was. But he doesn't. In V6 of John 11 we read that Jesus stayed where he was for two more days and only then did he say to his disciples that they should set off. Why might Jesus have waited? Jesus had a great love for this family at Bethany so it wasn't that he couldn't be bothered. Our reading gives us some possibilities to ponder – Jesus knew that Lazarus would not die and Jesus draws attention to the fact that this whole situation should be glorifying to God. Jesus stays 'at home' – stays where he is.

But not for long. Jesus and the disciples travel to Bethany. Such travel is a dangerous business and Jesus' presence in Bethany draws attention to Jesus again and results in a plot to kill him (read John 12 for more on this!). Before he even reaches the house he sees Martha who comes to meet him on the road. We only catch a snippet of their conversation. Spend some time imagining it in more detail. What would you have said to Jesus if you were Martha? Mary too wants to talk to Jesus when he arrives. What would you have said to him if you were Mary?

The situation for Mary, Martha and Lazarus is about to change. Despite the four days in the tomb and the bad smell that Martha has warned him about, Jesus asks that the stone be taken from the tomb entrance. And far from 'Stay in' Jesus calls to Lazarus "Come out!" (verse 43). Lazarus still wrapped in graveclothes, emerges from the tomb.

And we will emerge also. It's my prayer that we will emerge from Covid-19 enriched in our faith. It's my prayer that we will emerge from Covid -19 with a deeper appreciation of the many blessings God has given to us. Its my prayer that we will emerge from Covid 19 not taking for granted things like a hug or a handshake. And it's my prayer that whilst we stay at home and when we emerge we will know that Jesus is with us. In the bewildering times, Jesus as he was with Martha and Mary, is with us. In the times of sadness and loneliness,

may we know that Jesus weeps with us. And at all times - staying in or going out - may we glorify God and hold these words of Jesus which he said to Martha, especially close: "I am the resurrection and the life" (John 11: 25).

Heavenly Father, we pray for those, maybe including ourselves, who are living alone and unable to go out, and we give thanks to those in our communities who are reaching out to them to make sure that they/we are safe. Make us alive Lord, to the needs of our community, fill us with compassion and help us to share in each other's worries and also in each other's joys.

We pray for those who are ill, particularly those in hospital and for their families. We give thanks for the doctors and nurses and other health staff who are caring for them, and ask that you will keep them safe in their work. We bring before you Lord, those who have lost loved ones and ask, that in their sorrow they will know your love, and in their despair, they will find hope.

And Lord, we pray for ourselves, that in these uncertain times our faith will never waiver and that each day we will grow closer to you.

Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer. Amen.
