



# Burnley Ministers tell their Stories via TV

At the height of the Covid pandemic, the work of two Christian ministers in Burnley, Lancashire, moved TV viewers across the world. They were filmed by a BBC crew handing out food parcels and seeking to help people suffering deeply because of the lockdown.

The two men – **Pastor Mick Fleming** and **Father Alex Frost** – have now published books telling their remarkable stories.

In 'Blown Away: From Drug Dealer to Life Bringer,' (SPCK), Mick Fleming tells how he struggled with a traumatic childhood and turned to drugs and to

crime, but ultimately came to faith following a series of events that many will call miraculous.

He explains how he launched 'Church on the Street' in Burnley – one of the poorest parts of England – after he sat on the ground outside McDonald's "with a suitcase of clothes, tea and coffee in flasks, and sandwiches, and a packet of cigarettes in my pocket."

Pastor Mick tells how angry he felt when the churches closed their doors during the Covid lockdowns. People were suffering, going hungry and the Church was, he writes, nowhere to be seen.

In 'Our Daily Bread' (Harper North), the Rev Alex Frost gives telling insights into what Christian ministry is like in Britain in the 2020s, serving some of the country's poorest people. He shows the role played by one Church of England Priest, and his church, in serving the people of his Burnley parish, as they face life's challenges and setbacks.

He writes "Here, in a deprived northern town, where the headlines usually scream poverty and destitution, there is also an undaunted spirit and an unwavering survival instinct. People here are stronger than you could ever imagine."

Father Alex tells the stories of some of the people with whom he ministers, under headings such as Love, Broken, Calling, Grief and Transformation. As he tells their stories, he reveals his own, including working as a football referee, stand-up comic and an Argos store manager. Father Alex weaves his own story among those of the parishioners he serves.

He writes, with passion, "I want to see the Church of England change dramatically, coming out of its middle-class bubble, its 'Waitrose worship' and start to represent who we are as a nation now."

**Revd James Mather, Ukraine: Ukraine Chain** has been supporting the community of displaced people at Ciudei, in western Ukraine, for some months now. They number about 50, of whom 22 live in the church. You may remember that we previously have appealed for funds for their support, including firewood for the winter, and a generator. There were generous donations to help with this.

Now that they are reasonably secure, the Christian community at Ciudei has started to assist less fortunate people who are stuck in the war zones in the eastern Donbas region. The two priests and a team of volunteers go with vans full of food parcels to areas devasted by war, where the people live under very dangerous conditions, some taking shelter in ruins. **Ukraine Chain** is funding these food parcels and would very much appreciate donations to help with this.

# **Green Money**

I believe that we are all now very much aware of climate change on our planet and the negative effect in particular that emissions from fossil fuels are having. Each of us in our own way are looking at how we can reduce our individual carbon footprints. Maybe this might be by walking more, and not using the car for short journeys, or maybe even thinking ahead to having an electric car. However, there are other ways that we can make an even more significant reduction in our carbon footprint in the long term.

I recently attended an interesting talk at Christ Church Chineham on "Green Money" organized by Greener Basingstoke. As the title suggests it was focused on ethical financial investments both in pension funds and in personal savings, through funds that invest in environmentally friendly projects, and not in traditional fossil fuels such as oil and gas.

Many of us make contributions into either company or private pension funds in our working lives, or put money into long term savings plans. If these long-term investments are made into environmentally friendly funds it can result in significant reduction in our carbon emissions. Greener Basingstoke are making us aware of this. For more information why not contact them and investigate. We need a Greener World!

Note of course, that all financial service providers should be registered with the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) who regulate the financial services industry in the UK. Its role includes protecting consumers, keeping the industry stable, and promoting healthy competition between financial service providers. The FCA works with HM Treasury.





# **Empowering Women in Pakistan with the Word of God**

The Bible Society is helping women in Pakistan learn to read by holding regular Bible-based literacy classes in the Khyber region. "Before the Bible Society came, there was not a single school for girls in this region. Education for girls was considered immoral," says Beena, a former hospital cleaner and mother of eight children. "Now we have started a Bible study group in the family and every day we read two or three chapters. We started with the New Testament."

The literacy rate in Pakistan is 58 per cent, but among Christian women it is estimated to be just 34 per cent. The Bible Society hopes to educate 3,500 women in the region by teaching them to read the Bible. If you can help, please visit:





### Basingstoke Town Chaplaincy Prayer Letter - January 2023



Christmas 2022 was celebrated with more events and visits than in recent years, although there were still various infections doing the rounds. The Chaplains took token gifts of sweets and cards to those they work with and this gesture of caring was appreciated. We received a specific donation to cover much of the cost. There were several deep conversations with people who needed pastoral care in the build-up to Christmas and also as the pressures of life had built up. Chaplains are as busy as ever listening and supporting people. It is a privilege. That we are asked about spiritual matters and can share something of our faith in Jesus Christ is a joy.

BTC was one of several chaplaincies represented at the Christmas meal hosted by a Turkish Muslim organisation. The theme was loneliness and various speakers stressed the presence and causes of loneliness in our community. Chaplains do meet lonely people.

We have been asked to provide more Chaplain time at the foyer of the train station where we can meet passengers and railway staff. This is an opportunity to expand and to explore different times of working. We will look to engage and see where God leads.

Before Christmas we had an encouraging time at Basingstoke Baptist Church sharing about the Chaplaincy; and we have recently been warmly welcomed at St Bede's church to give a 5-minute presentation on the Chaplaincy at each of their services and afterwards to talk to members of the congregation. We are open to visit any church that invites us or to talk to a small group. We value the prayer support of churches and individuals and also want to have good links with churches so that we can help guide people to a local church when we have opportunities to do so.

Recently we have received some positive feedback from the Magistrates' Court about the value of our service there. We have been able to expand the chaplaincy service to Stagecoach by facilitating Chaplains attending other bus stations in the region.

We had a lunch with some of our supporters recently and thought about the coming year. We liked the idea of "bold humility". We want to share boldly the good news of Jesus Christ but in a gentle manner to show God's love and relevance to each and every person's life.

Please continue to pray for the contacts, and resultant conversations Chaplains have, that the right words will be used and appropriate support provided.

We need more Chaplains. Please consider whether you, or someone you know, could be a Chaplain. Find out more about us. You are welcome to come and see what we do and go out on a round with a Chaplain. There is no obligation.

May you know the blessing and joy of the Lord throughout 2023.

The Foodbank was 10 years old! October was the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Basingstoke Foodbank. Every year since 2012 it has fed around 3,000 people in crisis in the Basingstoke & Deane area, including 800 children. Since 2012 a total of over 42,900 people have been fed and 488 tonnes of food distributed. "While we are immensely grateful to the people and businesses of Basingstoke for their support over the years, and for the sterling efforts of over 100 volunteers, we're sad that in 2022 there is still a need for a foodbank in our town" said Phil Thomas, Chair of Trustees. "The current economic crisis means demand for our services is growing again and until the benefits system in this country is reformed, there will continue to be people and families in crisis with not enough to eat".

The Foodbank provides a three-day supply of food to anyone in crisis who is referred to it by over 120 different agency teams across the town. There are now believed to be more foodbanks in the UK than there are branches of McDonald's. The foodbank's work is a massive achievement and a reflection of the fantasic effort by a dedicated group of volunteers from churches and the community across Basingstoke. The whole community of Basingstoke & Deane generously provide crisis food for some of the needlest people in our town" said Phil. (taken from One Church Basingstoke)

Over 90% of food distributed by foodbanks in **The Trussell Trust** network is donated by the public – that's why your food donations are absolutely vital to enable us to give everyone referred a balanced, nutritious 3 day food supply.

Our Basingstoke Centre & Warehouse at Houndmills remains open for donations of food & toiletries including fresh veg, bread & eggs during regular opening times 10 am – 3 pm, Mon to Frid. If you would like to donate items, please look at the Foodbank website or previous newsletters where you will find fuller information – you can 'Shop and Drop' goods into the permanent crates provided by our supporting supermarkets – see our website.

### THE FUTURE OF OUR RECYCLING



Over the years we have been recycling a variety of food and household packaging and wrappers. It all started back in 2013, I believe, when we collected Danone yoghurt pots. After that it was coffee lids and pouches, biscuit wrappers, various household cleaning packaging / containers, baby food pouches and crisps. We always had 2 or 3 collections on the go, taking on a new one when TerraCycle removed any. In the beginning I was able to send in any quantity / weight of recycling but gradually a minimum weight was introduced. This meant storing the recycling at home until I had enough to send off. It was just about manageable and worth it for the funds raised which went to *Contesa*, now *Future Pillars Zambia*.

Sadly for us, the large Supermarkets have taken over much of the recycling we were doing which has affected us quite badly, especially with the loss of the Crisp Collection. We now only have recycling for biscuit wrappers and household cleaning items. Both of these are not as forthcoming as the crisps were and it takes a long time to collect enough for the minimum weight. Therefore, regretfully I am going to be closing the recycling programme later on this year. The recycling will continue until I have enough to send off the last shipment for both recyclings. We redeem our points for cash twice yearly, April 1<sup>st</sup> and November 1<sup>st</sup>. To ensure we raise as much money as possible, I will aim to send the last shipments in towards the end of October. This will give enough time for the points to be allocated to our account so that we can then redeem them.

Meanwhile, please help us to save as many biscuit wrappers as possible, savoury and sweet varieties, and the items from the household collection. These are the flexible packaging from dishwasher tablets, detergent, household wipes, tinted fabric conditioner bottles, tinted plastic tubs and plastic air fresheners.

Through the money we raise we are to supporting many vulnerable girls in Zambia who through the charity of Future Pillars receive a safe place to live, food, education and skills training in order to move from poverty to a better and sustainable future for themselves and their families. Help us to help them.
